registration. For current sophomores (rising juniors), we offer a standardized test preparation course in the second trimester led by Applerouth Tutoring Services. This small and comprehensive class includes engaging material and the opportunity for students to take 3 previouslyreleased, full-length standardized tests to practice their skills as they go.
