Rethinking Measures of Success and Well-Being



What do college rankings really measure? What is the relationship between selectivity and student outcomes? What is "fit"? Why does it matter?

Challenge Success, a non-profit affiliated with the Stanford University Graduate School of Education uses survey data to address these questions in their recent white paper, "A

'Fit' Over Rankings: Why College Engagement Matters More Than Selectivity."

The 22-page document first shares the criteria and weighting system used by U.S. News and World Report and dissects the meaning behind the measurements. Then, it confronts the thought that a more selective college better prepares its students for future satisfaction and well-being. One of the biggest takeaways from the white paper is,



"the students who benefit most from college are those **Stanford** "the students who benefit most from college are those who are most engaged in their academics and campus communities, taking advantage of the opportunities and resources their particular institution provides. *Engagement* is the key."

Fit is more than finding the right location, academic offerings, and extracurricular activities such as Greek life, athletics, or the arts; fit, as defined by the paper is "a college where a student will be engaged – in class and out – by what the college has to offer."

"Students Should Sacrifice far Less for the Sake of Getting Into College and do Much More to Thrive Within and Beyond It"

David Coleman, CEO of the College Board, recognizes the stresses evoked by the college application process. In his recent *The Atlantic* article, "There's more to College Than Getting Into College," Coleman shares his advice to students so they can "have the kind of transformative experience in college that fosters personal success and happiness." Making the Most of Your Summer: A Follow-Up to our Essay-Writing Workshops

While the Class of 2019 was away on serving communities through Habitat for Humanity, the college counselors spent time over two days with the Class of 2020 in their English courses introducing the college essay. We shared the 2019-2020 prompts for both the Common Application and the Coalition; both of which are the most frequently used application platforms. During our Summer Workshops (see dates and details to the left in our Save the Dates column), we will work directly with the seniors to create these accounts. In addition to using a Prezi to share information and helpful thoughts from colleges and universities like Georgia Tech and Tufts University, counselors and students read, reviewed, and dissected writing samples. On the second day of our workshops, students learned more about supplemental essays and the value of knowing the "why" behind their choices: why this school? why this program? why this passion?



Students were encouraged to share their thoughts and ideas with their respective counselors to hopefully seek guidance as they proceed with the editing process. We promise it will make the application process a much simpler one if the Class of 2020 can start their senior year with their essay completed or nearly completed.

Summer ACT Boot Camp

As a final reminder for the summer, Applerouth is pleased to offer its second annual Summer Boot Camp for rising juniors and seniors, which runs from July 27 through August 8. The Boot Camp, which costs \$549 is a two-week, 20-hour intensive instructional period focusing on major standardized test concepts and strategies. An expert tutor leads the course, using engaging teaching methods to keep material compelling and digestible. Test guides and session notes are provided to help reinforce study and retention. Two mock test opportunities are included with the course and students will receive a detailed results-analysis to help them chart their own unique course towards mastering the ACT. Reminders for our Juniors

Coaches are aware that this is a requirement for every senior. A sign-up form will be sent in mid to late July.
