### Out and About...

This summer, our counselors took the road and visited a variety of campuses around the country. Below, you'll find a snippet of interesting information for you to review and consider as you look for the best-fit college:



Dartmouth College: 4,400 undergraduates. An Ivy League institution running on a yearlong quarter system. While students must spend seven of the 12 quarters on campus, mostly in the first and fourth year, students can take advantage of the D-Plan, which allows for study on campus, study off-campus (abroad or at another institution), or the ability to go on leave and participate in an internship or research opportunity. 60% of students take advantage of study abroad opportunities. Much of social life revolves around Greek life and the Dartmouth Outing Club.



The George Washington University: 10,500 undergraduates. An urban school with a mostly-defined-Foggy Bottom campus where the majority of students live and take courses; about ¼ of freshman live within the Mount Vernon Campus, which is also home to several Living Learning Communities. While there are no dining halls, over 90 eateries and grocery stores accept the "GWorld" meal plan. With seven undergraduate colleges, students have the flexibility to move within disciplines and colleges. Home to a strong International Affairs program with multiple study abroad and internship options.



**Georgetown University**: 7,000 undergraduates. Founded by Jesuits on the basis that each student, regardless of religious affiliation, should have the right to education, students are required to take a core curriculum including two of each theology, philosophy, and foreign language courses. A traditional college feel with plenty of green space and communal areas in a city setting. Home to four colleges, each of which has particular application questions, all of which are housed in Georgetown's own platform. Alumni interviews are a crucial component of the application process.



The Pennsylvania State University: 40,000 undergraduates at University Park (main campus) and over 76,000 in total from all campuses. A public research university which devotes over \$800 million per year in research; students can begin participating in the freshman year. Proudly boasts the largest living alumni network of all colleges and universities. Offers over 275 majors between 12 colleges and the Division of Undergraduate Studies for those students who are

undecided in terms of their major. Top-performing students are also welcome to apply to Schreyer Honors College.

University of Virginia: 16,000 undergraduates. The first college in the nation established around a library instead of a church and now home to 13 libraries on campus. UVA is one of the only two public universities that are both need-blind *and* meet 100% of demonstrated need for domestic students. As the state flagship university, 60% of their students must be Virginia residents. Professors are required to offer the same number of office hours as those they teach in class/lecture hours. An intellectual atmosphere rooted in Jeffersonian communal learning tradition and a student-regulated Honors Code; aims to produce "citizen scholars."

Wesleyan University: 3,000 undergraduates. Known for their open curriculum (meaning *no* core curriculum or general distribution requirements), students at Wesleyan often double major or add at least one minor. Classes are divided into three main areas: natural sciences and mathematics, social and behavioral sciences, and humanities and arts. Dedicated to close advising and students stretching themselves beyond their "one thing." A place where the theoretical meets practical.

#### Some Reminders for Seniors

With summer winding down and only a few weeks left before our next school year begins, we have a few things for seniors to keep in mind. During the week of **August 19-23**, the college counselors will be hosting workshops for seniors to begin and hopefully complete the Common Application. Seniors **must register for one** of ten two and a half hour sessions; the link can be found on Haiku or seniors may register directly through the Google Form. All football players will participate in the Friday afternoon session as noted on their pre-season schedule. For those students who cannot attend the August Workshops, we will have a make-up session on September 9<sup>th</sup> at 3:00 p.m.

Additionally, seniors **must complete** the Senior Questionnaire (also found on Haiku) to have their first meeting with their college counselor. Without this questionnaire, **counselors will not be able to write your official letter of recommendation**. If you have any questions, please contact your college counselor directly.
