Course Selection Straight Ahead



In the coming weeks, students will meet with their course selection coaches to begin the process of course registration. We urge *all* students to continue taking **academic major courses** (English, math, science, social studies, and world language) throughout each of the four years here at Bullis, even if they have met Bullis School's graduation requirements.

For current sophomores, we offer a standardized test preparation course in the winter trimester led by Applerouth Tutoring Services. This course costs \$649 and is taught twice a week during a student's study hall block. Bullis partners with Applerouth Tutoring Services to bring students a comprehensive and interactive class on how to tackle standardized tests and increase score-outcomes. In 20 hours of class-time, Applerouth's expert tutor covers not only the content and format of the test but also key strategies for test-taking. This small and comprehensive class includes engaging material and provides the opportunity for students to take 3 previously-released, full-length standardized tests to practice their skills as they go.

In February, Mrs. Miller had the opportunity to visit five schools in California. Below, you'll find a snippet of interesting information for you to review and consider as you look for the best-fit college:



Pepperdine University: 3,600 undergraduates. One of the most beautiful college campuses in the country overlooking the ocean from the bluffs in Malibu. Strong Christian background with required convocation credits. Impressive study abroad programs. 20% first-generation students (something very important to them), and unique classes in topics like surfing.
